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What is a reasonable doubt?

Well, the word suggest their meaning. A reasonable doubt is a doubt based upon a reason and it is a doubt for which a juror could give a reason if he or she wanted to.

You are under no obligation to tell me or anyone else why you have a doubt if you have a doubt. But you should be able to tell yourself why you have a doubt.

It is defined as an actual doubt. A doubt that you realize you have after you consider the whole case and all the evidence.

if you then feel unsure, not fully convinced that Mr.

Dellos Santos is guilty and if you believe that a reasonable person sitting where you're sitting, hearing what you heard would also have that hesitation that's a reasonable doubt and Mr. Dellos Santos would be entitled to a verdict of not guilty.

Now, a reasonable doubt cannot be based on a guess or a speculation. Nor, is it a wall behind which a juror may hide to avoid a painful or a disagreeable duty.

And I charge you that the prosecution does not have to convince you beyond all doubt or to a mathematical or scientific certainty. That's impossible.

But, proof beyond a reasonable doubt is the highest standard of proof we have in our whole system of jurist prudence and it is not satisfied by a possibility or a

1	value. And standing alone it may hevel be the basis for a
2	finding of guilt.
3	Now, Mr. Dellos Santos has pleaded not guilty to each

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An expert's testimony is given to assist you to reach a proper conclusion and is entitled to such weight as you find the expert's qualifications in his field warrants. An expert opinion must be considered by you but it is not controlling. You still make the final decision.

Now, under our law Luz Mulero was an accomplice of Mr. Dellos Santos in the narcotics transaction at issue in this case because there is evidence that she participated in and pleaded guilty to a crime related to the narcotics charges that the prosecution has brought against Mr. Dellos Santos.

Similarly, if you credit the testimony in this case,

Mr. Brito was an accomplice of Mr. Dellos Santos in regard

to the crimes that allegedly occurred inside 478 West 145th

Our law is especially concerned about the testimony of an accomplice who implicates another in the commission of a crime. Particularly when the accomplice has received, expects or hopes for a benefit in return for his or her testimony.

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

You come into the courtroom not like snitches, not like making deals with criminals, but before you're too critical of Luz Mulero's motive you realize without Lucy still nobody gets caught Without Lucy Manuel Gonzalez is still dead and nobody has paid the price for it. Without her Rafael never gets caught for his role in this. Punalata, Mr. Brito. never gets caught for this case. Ellerman Valverde, never gets caught and Chacal. Juan Rincon, a man who put the bullet to the back of the head of Manuel Gonzalez. No one ever knows about him. He would be a free man to this Who knows who else he might had killed up until day. today? He didn't. They were all caught because of Lucy Mulero. And I make no apologies here. She got a little bit of a lighter sentence and avoided being deported and raised her own children. I would make the same deal tomorrow. The price I pay anytime for the result that she got.



get deported. She was desperate not to lose her children, not to lose her baby. She was so desperate she wouldn't dare not tell the truth. She wouldn't dare risk all that by getting caught in any lie.

And remember she told you and it is common sense if you tell the officer the truth that there were four people and lied about the fifth you tell 9/10ths of the truth and you're caught with one deliberate lie. You lose everything. Why would you do that? And no one would doubt for a second she told most of the truth. And this is an important point. She gave lots and lots of information. As you know she told the police about all five people that were involved in this incident.

Now, all you care about now is the defendant. That's all you should care about. That's your job is to evaluate evidence against him.

Go back to March of 2002. It is not Lucy telling the police about only Miguel Dellos Santos. She's talking about all five people. Miguel Dellos Santos, his brother Rafael, Ellerman, Valverde. "He's in jail. You can talk to him". Two other guys, Punalata, Chacal. No question she was telling the truth about the other four people. No one is for a second suggesting she hasn't. So why would she tell you about them truthfully and then risk everything, risk losing her children by lying about him? It makes no

police, they are thinking of trying to spin it in a wrong way. Admit what they can't deny but deny whatever they can and if they have to they are going to lie and make up stuff, whatever they can do to help themselves. But, in this context when you're a cooperator the truth is going to help you no matter where it goes.

Okay. If you're a guilty person caught when the police speak to you, yes, the truth may hurt you. But, when you're cooperating, when you're getting something for your information, the truth is what's going to help you.

And, again, Lucy is a perfect example of that. When she goes to the police for the first time she would have no idea what the police know, what they know, what they don't know, who they talked to, wouldn't know what the wife of the victim and the father-in-law said. She wouldn't know what they told the police. She wouldn't know if they talked to Wilson or anything he had said. She wouldn't know who they talked to. She wouldn't know how the actions inside have been described. And, of course, beyond that they would know originally when she tells who else was involved in the crime. She's going to assume sooner or later they are going to find most, if all, of those people and maybe some of them are going to talk and if she's going to lie to them how easy is it to get caught.

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And like I would say most cooperators, you can call them snitches, call them whatever you want, what they do for the most part they don't say "Aha, I'm going to go and lie to the police. I'm going to go lie to the DA". don't have to like them or anything about them. You have to understand their motives.

When you analyze it logically use your common sense and decide are they going to go and lie to the police? As a cooperator her point is to give the police useful valuable information. That's what you're getting in return for useful information. They don't want to give lies. Don't you think in most cases it's pretty easy to figure out when someone is lying to you? Either at first when they talk to you or certainly when they do some more digging investigating and talk to more witnesses those lies are going to become obvious.

Now, a cooperator who has already decided to do that. if they have any brains at all, is tell the truth. the only way to make sure you don't get caught in a lie. Because if you get caught in a lie you lose your whole The only way to not get caught in the lie is very deal. simple. You don't tell a lie in the first place. You tell the truth. It is just common sense.

You know, in a different context someone gets arrested if they committed a crime, get caught and they speak to the Lourdes Torres-Fuster, Senior Court Reporter



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making deals so I don't trust them. I'm not going to believe them. That's just too easy. Analyze it logically.

As to Lucy her reasons, her motivations for coming She's arrested. This crime happens in October of here. 1999. She's arrested with some other kidnapping in July of 2000. She's sitting in jail till March of 2002. At some point she pleads guilty on that case. She realizes she may not have a big role in the kidnapping but she was there. She was in the apartment, in Ellerman's basement apartment with the kidnapping victim when the cops get there. She doesn't want to go to trial. She pleads guilty and is promised a five year jail sentence. Nothing to do with this case. She realizes, well, she realizes the consequences of that. She realizes time in prison then she'll get deported then she's going to lose her children. Doesn't want that to happen.

And, she's kind of desperate. No question about it when she realizes she is no longer alone. She has one card to play. She's got information about a murder. Information she knows the police would love to hear. And by this point she realizes what's going to happen to her life. She's desperate. She's so desperate she figures I got to play that card. I got to talk to the police and tell them and so she does.

is. Do you have doubt in your mind we have the right guy. That's what a criminal case is about. That's what our burden of proof is about. Proof beyond a reasonable doubt that he, not somebody else, committed this crime.

Now, I suggest the facts are pretty clear but let's look at them. That's your job, of course, is to find the facts. And you might think you come into the case, look obviously, one way to do that is by determining the believability what we call the credibility of all the witnesses.

And you might think coming into the case, well, you heard there were two witnesses who were cooperating who themselves were criminals who in some way were involved in this who made deals. Judging their credibility is going to be the hardest thing to do in this case.

I suggest if once you sort through what the witnesses said when they first said it, what their motivations are, what other witnesses said there's really not a whole lot in there what they said not to believe. Both of them Lucy and Brito through all their flaws. And Brito certainly has those. No one is disputing that. And Lucy also back then. Certainly she was involved in a life of drug dealing and crime too. But, with all their flaws and all their motivations what exactly is it not to believe about what they said. Mr. Brito said, oh, they're cooperating and

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And as the judges of the facts you will be called upon to weigh, assess and evaluate the credibility, the reliability, the believability of the witnesses, the strangers, you're going to meet here.

You have to determine is the witness truthful or not. is the witness accurate or exaggerating. is the witness reliable or unreliable. I have no golden rule to give you as to how to do that. No judge does. But, I can say that in a short time these lawyers had with you they picked you because they felt you exhibited good common sense. SO use that common sense. Bring it right in here everyday. Use the same strategies, the same guidelines that you would use to size up any stranger that you might meet in your daily life. Use those strategies to size up the strangers you're going to meet here.

The one rule that I can give you is that if you find any witness intentionally lies to you about something important in this case you may disregard their entire You may accept any portion of it that you testimony. believe is truthful. You may accept all of it. It's entirely up to you.

And I ask you not only to listen to the witness but Observe the witness. Because I'm look at the witness. sure you will agree with me that the way a person responds their demeanor may be as important as what they say, so
