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is. Do you have doubt in your mind we have the right guy. That's what a criminal case is about. That's what our burden of proof is about. Proof beyond a reasonable doubt that he, not somebody else, committed this crime.

Now, I suggest the facts are pretty clear but let's look at them. That's your job, of course, is to find the facts. And you might think you come into the case, look obviously, one way to do that is by determining the believability what we call the credibility of all the witnesses.

And you might think coming into the case, well, you heard there were two witnesses who were cooperating who themselves were criminals who in some way were involved in this who made deals. Judging their credibility is going to be the hardest thing to do in this case.

I suggest if once you sort through what the witnesses said when they first said it, what their motivations are, what other witnesses said there's really not a whole lot in there what they said not to believe. Both of them Lucy and Brito through all their flaws. And Brito certainly has those. No one is disputing that. And Lucy also back then. Certainly she was involved in a life of drug dealing and crime too. But, with all their flaws and all their motivations what exactly is it not to believe about what they said. Mr. Brito said, oh, they're cooperating and
